For those of you who could not attend the September meeting in Nashville, you missed a terrific convention. This year we had a great representation from many of the NFOS schools. I hope in the future that more schools will plan to attend this important event. Once again, the ABO/NCLE provided a great venue for education, organizational business meetings and a chance for the NFOS faculty to showcase their talents. It is my understanding that the NFOS courses were very well attended.

The pre-convention activities started on Wednesday, with the Opticianry Summit Collaboration. As many of you are aware, opticianry is trying to find common ground where all the organizations can work together for the advancement of opticianry. At the meeting on September 3, twenty two optician leaders participated in the forum. Representing the NFOS were Kimberly Strickler, Vice President of the NFOS and myself. In summary, participants identified initiatives for potential alignment and collaboration. These issues involved the following: mobility of opticians from state to state, formal education access to opticians in unlicensed states via college programs and facilitating continued regular communication between all organizations. Regarding formal education, I presented to members of the collaboration committee that the NFOS is committed to helping unlicensed states start college degree programs for opticians. Presently, we have a number of states that are looking into starting degree programs.

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On Thursday, September 4, the NFOS had its business meeting in Nashville. At the meeting, I asked for the following resolution to be considered by the membership:

The NFOS recommends that beginning in 2015 all newly hired full-time and part-time faculty have a minimum of a Bachelor's Degree

Note, this recommendation will not supersede the current hiring practices or credentials at individual institutions.

It will not affect the status of current faculty

The resolution was passed unanimously and will take effect January 1, 2015.

This year our NFOS College Bowl was once again a huge success. The NFOS College Bowl was chaired by Kimberly Strickler from New York City College of Technology and a new NFOS College Bowl format was developed by Blair Wong from Benjamin Franklin Institute of Technology. This year, Michael Carrano from Middlesex Community College was our college bowl winner. I want to congratulate Ray Dennis and his school for a job well done. In fact, all the school contestants were just terrific and represented their prospective programs with great pride. We should all be proud of all our student participants.

In closing, I want to wish everyone a happy and joyous holiday season and a healthy new year. I hope to see everyone in Dallas in 2015.

News from Reynolds Community College

This fall has brought a strong enrollment and a few new faculty changes at Reynolds. Many of you have met adjunct faculty member Ann Grubbs at previous NFOS meetings. We have also welcomed two new adjunct faculty to our ranks – Janine Lewis started with her first laboratory clinical course this past fall and Greg Gearheart will be joining us in the spring as the new business management instructor. Hired for their specific areas of expertise, we are excited to have them both join our team.



Thanks to a community grant we received, our students, faculty and alumni were able to help over 150 children from Richmond City Public schools receive free eye health examinations and much needed eyewear this year.

Social services, along with school nurses helped identify the children with the most need. The prescriptions filled ranged from +5.00 to -15.00 with up to 3 diopters of cylinder in

several cases. Some of the children had never had eyeglasses before, others might have had eyeglasses in the past but they've been broken for 3 or 4 years.



Our Opticianry students will be the first to tell you that they also benefited from this program. Not only from getting hands-on learning by fitting, fabricating and dispensing the eyewear but from the tremendous feeling of pride and accomplishment that they were in to meet needs of the youngest in our own community.

I am so very proud of how eager our alumni and students were to support these events. It is our goal to continue to seek grants for the future so we can make these activities yearly events!
